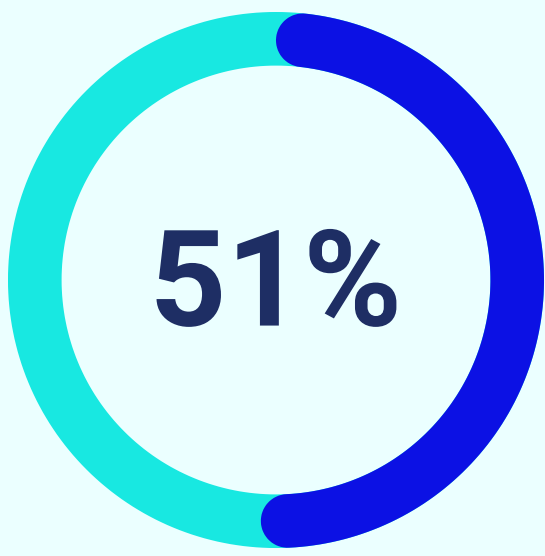
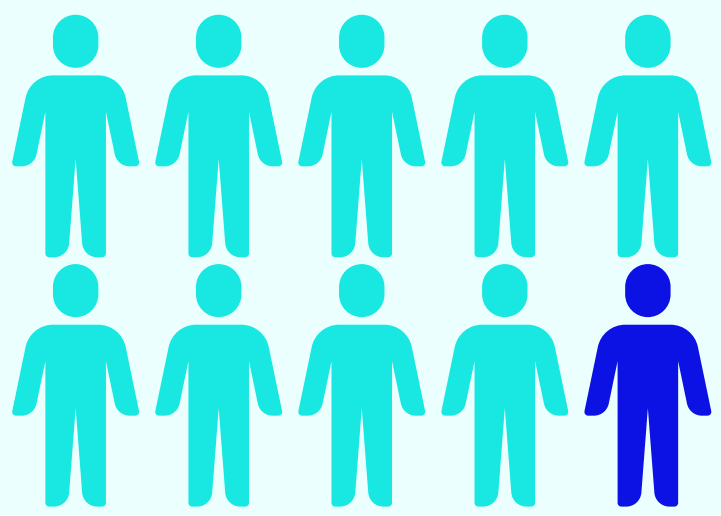


Exploring the value of technology in education

The UK Department for Education polled teaching and school administrators from across the UK on their opinions regarding EdTech. The percentage of teachers who agreed with the following statements:

Student attainment
is improved by access to technology



Technology saves time
on parental engagement



Teacher workload
can be reduced by technology



Evidence from the 2021 DfE EdTech Survey suggests that many schools have successfully implemented and begun using technology to support teaching and day-to-day management, saving them time, reducing teacher workload, and contributing to improved pupil attainment.

In particular, schools have relied heavily on EdTech to deliver remote education and positively, the majority believed that they could effectively support pupils to learn remotely. Crucially, the majority of schools intend to continue investing in EdTech solutions in the future.

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
